Dear Mr. Weisberg,

In light of your recent letter, I feel it would be inappropriate for me to follow up with a letter of length as had been planned.

To a degree, I was misunderstood. My object was not to theorize as to the reasons or motives behind these killings.

As you and I both know, everybody and his grandmother is aware of the motives behind these assassinations.

The knowledge that you are connected with Bernard Fensterwald and his investigative group is good enough for me that you are on the right ~~track~~ <sup>TRACK</sup>.

What I had planned, basically, was a personal comment on specific bits of evidence in the JFK case as documented in EXECUTIVE ACTION, INQUEST, RUSH TO JUDGMENT, LEGACY OF DOUBT, and the assassination special as done by The National Tattler.

With regard to both Members of Congress and the local and national news media, it is my feeling that a wholly inadequate job has been done in this field.

The RIGHT people have not been contacted, not ENOUGH contacts have taken place, and the QUALITY and QUANTITY of information presented to these contacts has been less than desirable.

Although I don't doubt in the least that your knowledge of the JFK assassination is much greater today than 11 years ago, what good is it?

Hopefully, the goal is both knowledge and bringing the guilty to justice.

Let's please get this thing off dead center!

Finally, the unorthodox investigative approach I had hinted at will now be pursued privately by myself.

I am astonished at an investigator who doesn't have time for new methods of approach.
