Jack Ruby gun goes on trial

DALLAS (AP) — Jury selection began Monday in a trial to decide who is the rightful owner of a .38-caliber Colt Cobra revolver Jack Ruby used

to kill presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald.

The case before Dallas County Probate Judge Robert E. Price could end 23 years of legal wrangling between Ruby's heirs and Jules Mayer, a lawyer who knew Ruby and was named executor of the Dallas nightclub owner's estate.

Ruby died Jan. 3, 1967.

Regardless of the trial's outcome, it's unlikely to be the last word on the

Last year, the Internal Revenue Service stepped into the case claiming that Ruby owed \$17,000 when he died. That amount, the IRS said, has grown to \$86,010 with interest and penalties. The state of Texas also claims the estate owes it \$1,227 in back taxes. [And 16/30/90
