Ruby Warned Of 'Frameup' in Smuggled Note

DALLAS, Tex., Jan. 19 (AP).

—Jack Ruby wrote that he was
"part of a terrible political
frameup" in a note he managed
to get smuggled out of the Dallas County Jail a few months
before his death, the Times
Herald reported Thursday.

The contents of the note were made public Wednesday by a jail repairman who said Ruby slipped him the note as they shook hands through the bars of Ruby's cell.

NAME WITHHELD

Ruby, a former Dallas strip joint operator, killed Lee Harvey Oswald, the man identified by the Warren Commission as the assassin of President John F. Kennedy.

Ruby was awaiting a second murder trial when he was taken from the jail to Parkland Hospital Dec. 9. He died of a cancer-related blood clot Jan. 3.

The repairman said he did not wish his name to be because one line of the short note read: "Your life would be in danger if they knew you knew all of this. He did not identify "they."

FEARED FOR JEWS

The note also reportedly said that Ruby feared that millions of Jews were to be slaughtered.

"... you can save the Jews in Israel and other parts of the world from being slaughtered," the note read. "You see, if this is happening here and the Jews in Israel and other countries were varned, they could save themselves. Please believe every you if you can help to save millions of people."
