1. For your information, a present employee of the Central Intelligence Agency has reported a telephone conversation had with the above Subject during the evening of 14 May 1964.

2. Our present employee indicated that she resides in Prince Georges County, Maryland and several months previously had registered as a Republican in order to vote in the primary elections. During the evening of 14 May 1964 the Subject telephoned our employee indicating that she was one of the delegates on the Republican ballot and was supporting Senator Barry Goldwater. During the conversation our employee indicated to Mrs. [REDACTED] that she hadn't decided which candidate to support and that although she had registered Republican she held a deep respect for the late President Kennedy. Our employee stated to Mrs. [REDACTED] that she liked the late President Kennedy's stand on Cuba whereupon [REDACTED] said "too bad he was selling us down the river".

3. Also during the telephone conversation [REDACTED] advised our employee that an acquaintance in West Virginia (city or town not given) who said he was a former CIA Courier, had told her [REDACTED] prior to the assassination of the late President Kennedy that President Kennedy would be assassinated and that the assassin in turn would also be killed. Mrs. [REDACTED] further advised that her attempts to locate this person in West Virginia after the assassination were not successful. According to Mrs. [REDACTED] words this person "just disappeared from sight" following the assassination of the late President Kennedy. [REDACTED] further advised our employee that the "ex-CIA Courier"

lived in West Virginia where there was a cafeteria; however the food did not agree with him and due to the latter she [REDACTED] took him into town for meals. [REDACTED] further indicated that the "ex-CIA Courier" told her that he "had too much knowledge" indicating that the latter was the reason he left the Agency. [REDACTED] stated that the "ex-CIA Courier" told her a lot of things relative to people in high places in the U. S. Government which was quite shocking and the information worried her [REDACTED] very much.

4. Due to the absence of any identifying data concerning the alleged "ex-CIA Courier" this Agency has been unable to identify him.

5. If you deem it appropriate to contact Mrs. [REDACTED] and the identity of the "ex-CIA Courier" is made known to you, it is requested that his identity be passed to this Agency.
