Dear Senator Russell:

Since I last wrote you, my work in the two areas in which you had special interest has moved pretty far forward. The material of which I have given you copies no longer stands alone. That is, I have fortification of it and a duplicating, in some ways, a more sinister parallel.

You have been interested in whether or not information on Oswald was withheld from you, and my investigations in that direction have been quite fruitful. As a matter of fact, I think I have enough for a book on this subject alone.

My belief that, historically, the members of the Commission are among the victims of the great tragedy is firmer than ever.

If the trial in New Orleans proceeds as now scheduled, I will be going there before it begins. I have medical appointments in Washington the 9th, and if you should like to see me then, will be free much of the afternoon, probably beginning a little before lunch.

If there is any information I have that you would like to have, it is available to you on the same basis of confidence. Likewise, if you have any suspicions you would like me to investigate, I will do so on the same basis.
