Dear Mr. Campbell,

Thank you for your letter dated the 18th.

Unless it becomes possible for me to resume my field investigations before then, I will be in Washington Tuesday June 25, should you or the Senator want to see me.

One of the things which I have had greatest interest in these [redacted] investigations is the other aspect of the investigation in which the Senator seems to have had apprehensions. I have made what I regard as considerable progress and expect additional constructive information when I can resume my interviews with witnesses.

From this I have already reconstructed part of Oswald's life and connections that are not in any of the Warren Commission material, including the unpublished. Again, I think this is another field in which information was deliberately withheld from the members of the Commission. In one case that I regard as a very important one, I can now prove substantive changes in the testimony when it was printed. In the same case I can prove deliberate misrepresentation that may not be perjury but certainly was false testimony. Even more, I can show that some of these connections were known and still not presented to the members, are not in any of the unpublished material.
