My thinking about the JFK assassination and what it has meant to me and to the nation has changed over the years.

When I began what it meant for me was not in my mind. But the more time I spent on it the more I realized that it gave me the chance to meet the obligations with which we are all born, as Frost said, with promises to keep in the miles we go before we sleep. That meant more to me because I am the first of my family ever born into freedom. That freedom became mine by the accident of birth here.

The assassination of President Kennedy was in fact as it was de facto a coup d'etat. It resulted in an increasingly authoritarian government that increasingly subverts the spirit as well as the intent of those who to me were the world's greatest political thinkers, our Founding Fathers.
