He intends to slow down and undertake work on his prelims which may well be delayed as a result of his injuries and loss of time. I am afraid that you are going to be the only perpetual motion steel man left in the field.

Your place in Frederick sounds marvelous, and we are both looking forward to coming there. Gary did not see fit to take up your invitation to his parents, so I assume that he didn't want to share the occasion with his folks whom I gather are not terribly well initiated in the case. They are fine people, and when you come to Philadelphia, perhaps we can arrange a meeting with them.

We are most eager to read what you have written, and we do hope time permits. I'm confident that when this matter settles down to being history you will have to get credit for working the hardest on this case for the most sustained period of time and making the most important findings. Your work has been that of original researcher, energetic and imaginative investigator, marathon public relations man, the most prolific author in the field, and the major support for Garrison. I certainly hope that your full contributions are soon recognized. The society owes you an enormous debt. If any aspect of democratic society survives, it will be in a very large measure due to your brilliance, courage and pertinacity.
