Dear Gary,

Two things have been on my mind and in the few minutes before I leave to pick Lil up I address them briefly. By the way, Jerry and another friend were here this weekend. Jerry did a fine thing for me: he went out and bought me a new coffee pot (automatic), knowing Lil had just cracked my favorite. I appreciate it very much, but now must learn how to make coffee all over again.

One is your long silence. Is it just that you are busy, or is something troubling you? Has something turned up in analysis? (Except for an Xmas card with nothing but her name on it, I've heard nothing from Mary in a long, long time.)

Then there is Ned Crosby's question, unsolicited, how can he help me? I did not anticipate it, but immediately anticipated, from my experience with other people of means, that the answer could be a turn-off. So there are things I could have said that I didn't. I restricted myself to help in getting such things as PM printed.
