Your letter that arrived today, Monday, carried a note on a long telephone call you had with Don Scott of Sudbury on his JFK conference two years ago. In it you and he mentioned me

I would clear up two points he made to you. I am rather saddened to hear how Don Scott befuddled things.

On the extended airplane ticket that Scott suggested I stuck him with I would note that I originally decided to back out of the Sudbury conference altogether because its last day coincided with you and Lil's enrobing at Hood College that I did not intend to miss. After a couple of telephone calls he agreed that they wanted me to come to deliver my paper, as they phrased it, and then depart when the schedule required to meet my flights to D. C. I gave an academic luster to the affair I think. [Although he was initially a little taken aback at my paper topic on the hole in JFK's back being evidence that made the single bullet theory untenable. I think he wanted a rip roarer theory. I recall his exact words. "Well we can have a paper on the crime itself."]
