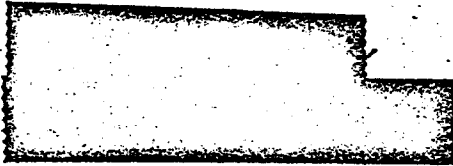

Reference is made to Part II, Volume 31, No. 212, of the Federal Register, Tuesday, November 1, 1966.

The Secret Service has in its possession the windshield which was removed from the vehicle in which President Kennedy was riding at the time of the assassination. The windshield, which was given Exhibit No. 350 by the President's Commission on the Assassination of President Kennedy, was returned to the Secret Service after being used by the Commission during its deliberation.

The title to the windshield is now vested in the United States.

We would appreciate being advised who should retain physical custody of the windshield. Unless some steps are taken to insure its preservation intact, we feel that further deterioration will render the article useless as evidence.
