Dear Tom,

I'm sorry you have not responded to my letter of June 10. Were you the Archives, I'd understand you haven't had time yet! I hope you will soon.

First of all, I believe it is an entirely proper request.

Second, I suggest, on the basis of what I have and know that you may not, you and the Secret Service have, I believe, an interest in seeing to it that that is not kept secret. If you desire, I'll explain this to you.

I also referred to my efforts to speak to you. As you know, I am not reluctant to write letters. The advantage they have for me may be a disadvantage for others. They make a written, continuing record.

I do not now know when I will be in Washington again. When I am, I will again phone. I'll be there the 12th, if not sooner. My wife has a medical appointment about five blocks from your office at 9:45 a.m. that day.
