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Oswald Not in 1963 Million-Name Secret Service File

WASHINGTON, May 12-The Secret Service had one million names in its index file of potene tial threats to Presidents at the time President Kennedy was assassinated Nov. 22, 1963, according to documents available today at the National Archives.

The file, which then did not include the name of Lee Harvey Oswald, the assassin, has since been winnowed down to 39,000, George Cosper, a special agent, S d said at the agency's headquar-I- ters.
