NEW ORLEANS, April 5 Clay L. Shaw pleaded not guilty at his formal arraignment today on charges of having conspired to murder President Kennedy.

The arraignment was over in four minutes. Defense attorneys predicted that the retired New Orleans business would go on trial within three to six months.
