CHANGE IN TRIAL MOYE EXPECTED

Shaw Conspiracy Case Is Set for February

Clay L. Shaw's attorneys are expected to seek a change of venue to move the conspiracy trial, scheduled for mid-February, out of New Orleans. The action could delay the trial for at least a month.

Arrested in March, 1967, Shaw is charged with participating in a plot to assassinate President John F. Kennedy.

In other developments in District Attorney Jim Garrison's probe, Edgar Eugene Bradley, the second man charged with conspiracy, is scheduled to appear Monday in Los Angeles County Superior Court for an extradition hearing.

Bradley, 49, of North Hollywood, had denied any connection with the assassination. Bradley's attorney, George J. Jensen, said he will ask for a continuance of Monday's hearing.

SETBACK GIVEN

Garrison received his second setback in three days Friday in his attempt to secure two Californians as material witnesses in the case.

Superior Court Judge Richard Schauer ruled that Lawrence Howard Jr., 33, of El Monte, 6 does not have to go to New I Orleans. The judge noted that I Garrison sent no one to testify at Friday's hearing.

Referring to the document signed by Criminal District Judge Matthew S. Braniff asking Howard's return, Schauer said, "The allegations in this certificate are not nearly as persuasive as the testimony of a live witness."

Howard denied at the hearing that he had any knowledge of a conspiracy to kill the President. He said the only time he was in New Orleans was June 4 or 5, 1863

Bradley testified that he had

never met Howard and did not know of any participation by

Howard in any conspiracy.

Earlier this week, a Bakersfield, Calif., judge rejected Gar-I
rison's request to have Loran I
A. Hall, another man sought as I
a material witness, returned to
New Orleans.

In another development Saturday, a proposal is under consideration to televise the Shaw trial on a secreted video-tape camera to be replayed later on the educational network, WYES, Channel 8, station here Criminal District Judge Edward A. Haggerty Jr., who will preside at the trial, met Friday with defense attorneys and DA officials to discuss the plan, which would be sponsored by the Ford Foundation.
