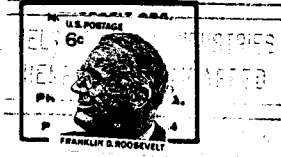

REPORT ON CLAY SHAW TALK, May 5, 1970, at Jefferson Hospital. I attended this talk. In the question period Clay Shaw was asked why he didn't think there was a conspiracy. After his answer I asked about the Zapruder film--didn't it clearly show that Kennedy was hit from the right front? He said no, he had seen the film many times at trial; there had been expert testimony on both sides. I said wasn't Kennedy's head knocked against the back of the seat? He said no, the movement was like this: then Kit. Shaw moved his head so slightly that you couldn't tell which way it moved. Actually, the killing shot drove the whole body of Kennedy to the left and back against the seat with great force. His body went to the left and back, hit the back of the seat and bounced forward. His shoulder hit the seat not his head--the seat was too low for this head to contact it. See Zapruder frames 313 to 329. 313 hit; 323 bounces against seat, behind him and to his left; 329 end of movement forward after bounce. These frames are in No. 18 of the Warren Commission volumes. Temple Library has them. Note that frames 314 and 315 are reversed in the book; you can tell because of the position of the woman in the background. That error was discovered and admitted. See also 547 seconds in Dallas by Jostiah Thompson, (Berard Gels, 1967) Chapter V, The Head Shots, pp. 86-7. As you remember, the Warren Commission said all the shots came from the rear. If the killing shot drove Kennedy's body to the left and back-wards then there was more than one gunman and therefore, a conspiracy. If Mr. Shaw saw the Zapruder film and the headshot therein, either he was not attentive or else he reported what he saw incorrectly in his talk at Jefferson Hospital.
