

Car Dealer Says Garrison Owes \$30,000

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 25 (AP)—A New Orleans businessman testified today that he borrowed \$30,000 for District Attorney Jim Garrison's probe of the assassination of President Kennedy. He said Garrison still owes him for it. It was the first public testimony of the amount of money forwarded Garrison in the controversial trial in which Clay Shaw was acquitted of conspiring to kill the President.

Willard Robertson, a car importer, said he was president of a group that came to be known as "Truth or Consequences Inc.," an organization of businessmen formed to help finance Garrison's investigation.

Robertson said she has no knowledge of how the money was used and never asked for an accounting. He said he did not know how much the total amount the group gave Garrison. The testimony came in a hearing in U.S. District Court on a motion by Shaw to prevent Garrison from taking him to court again, this time on a charge of lying to the jury that acquitted him.
