Over repeated defense objections, Dr. John M. Nichols gave his interpretation of the amateur movie of Mr. Kennedy's assassination in Dallas more than five years ago. His testimony contradicted an FBI photographic expert who said the evidence indicated Mr. Kennedy was Ninth Viewing shot from behind.

The key question and answer:

Q. Can you give your expert opinion as to the direction from which the President's head was struck?

A. After viewing the Zapruder film and photographs of the frames, I would say this is compatible with a gunshot view of the screen in the darkhaving been delivered from the front.

Nichols' testimony ran the same bullet before the President was shot fatally in the head.

Nichols was called in District Attorney Jim Garrison's attempt to prove Mr. Kennedy died in a cross fire from at least two guns as the result of a conspiracy involving Shaw, 55, who is standing trial on a charge that he conspired to kill the President.

After Nichols was called to the stand, the jury viewed the Abraham Zapruder movie or slides from it for the ninth time in three days.
