Herbert Evans Is Dead at 88

Dr. Herbert McLean Evans, discoverer of Vitamin E and co-discoverer of the human growth hormone, died Saturday at the age of 88.

Funeral services for Dr. Evans, professor of anatomy emeritus at the University of California School of Medicine here and an internationally famed biologist, will be held at 2 p.m. tomorrow (Tuesday) in the Berkeley Hills Chapel.

A native of Modesto, he received his B.S. degree from UC Berkeley, in 1904 and his medical degree from Johns Hopkins University in 1908, when he joined the Johns Hopkins faculty. He was appointed professor of anatomy on the Berkeley campus in 1915.

DUTY

Retiring in 1952, Dr. Evans was recalled to duty each year thereafter, until 1966, to continue his research and teaching.

Among his achievements was the discovery (with J. A. Long) of the human growth hormone, and his discovery in 1926 of Vitamin E and its essential role in reproduction.

He was the author of more than 750 scientific papers and was awarded many international honors, including honorary doctoral degrees from leading educational institutions in Europe, South America and the United States.

A Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, Dr. Evans was also a member of the National Academy of Sciences, the Kaiserliche Leopoldinisch-Carolinische Deutsche Akademie der Naturforscher, Societas Regia Medicorum Budapestinensis, American Physiological Society and the Society for Experimental Biology and Medicine.

He was also past president of the American Association of Anatomists and an honorary member of many foreign medical and scientific societies.

Dr. Evans was one of the founders of the History of Science Society and a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, Alpha Delta Pi, Alpha Omega Alpha and Nu Sigma Nu.

Surviving his death are a daughter, Mrs. Gail Evans La Forge of Mill Valley, and eight grandchildren, three of whom are the children of another daughter, Marion Evans Kaesar, now deceased. Dr. Evans' wife, Dorothy A. Evans, a widely known scholar in her own right, died in 1969.

A native and lifetime resident of San Francisco, Dr. Peters practiced dentistry here for 54 years. He maintained an office in the Elkan Gunst Building, Powell and Geary streets, from the time of the 1906 earthquake until he retired in 1958.

He was a graduate of St. Ignatius College, now the University of San Francisco, and the University of California at Berkeley, class of 1900.

Dr. Peters was also a member of the Family Club, the Commonwealth Club and the California Dental Association.

He is survived by his wife, Jean, who resides at the family home at 1880 Pacific avenue. Also surviving are two stepchildren, Wayne Peter and Mrs. Grace Church.

Services for Dr. Cleo Brunetti

Funeral services will be held tomorrow (Thursday) for Dr. Cleo Brunetti, an electronics pioneer whose work ranged from the invention of a two-way wrist radio to the design of huge solid-fuel rockets.

Dr. Brunetti, chief of long-range ordnance planning for FMC Corporation and a former associate director of Stanford Research Institute, died last Saturday in San Jose of an apparent heart attack. He was 61.

During the 1940s, Dr. Brunetti invented a two-way wrist radio that made a reality of the Dick Tracy fictional gadget. It could broadcast up to 200 feet.

CIRCUITS

But he was most noted professionally for his development of printed electric circuits and his work on radio proximity artillery fuses, an important World War II weapon.

A native of Virginia, Minn., he graduated with highest honors from the University of Minnesota and received his doctorate there in 1937.

A former chief of the engineering electronics section of the United States Bureau of Standards, Dr. Brunetti served as a professor at the University of Minnesota, Lehigh, George Washington and Stanford Universities.

Prior to his association with FMC in San Jose, he was president and a director of Grand Central Rocket Co. He also served as a director of engineering research and development for General Mills.

AWARDS

Dr. Brunetti, a Fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers, received numerous awards from the Army and Navy for exceptional service. He was the author of more than 150 technical publications.

He is survived by his wife, Nona; a daughter, Marlene Dias; a son, Ronald; a granddaughter, and two sisters, Mrs. Mario Casagrande and Mrs. Steve Barich.

Tomorrow's services will be held at 10:30 a.m. at the Chapel of the Oaks, Oak Hill Memorial Park, San Jose. A Rosary will be recited at 8 p.m. today (Wednesday) at the chapel.

Northwest Airlines Founder

ST. PAUL — (UPI) — Croil Hunter, 75, chairman emeritus of the board of Northwest Airlines, died Tuesday.

Mr. Hunter was president of the airline, which originated in St. Paul, from 1937 to 1952. He served as board chairman until 1965.

Under his management, Northwest was expanded from a local airmail carrier flying less than 400 miles into one of the world's leading airlines.

A native of Fargo, N.D., Mr. Hunter was graduated from Yale University in 1915.

He joined Northwest as general traffic manager in 1932, became vice president and general manager in 1933 and president in 1937.

Mr. Hunter is survived by his widow, Helen; a son, John; and a daughter, Mrs. Jeremiah Milbank Jr., of New York City.
