Dear Mr. Weisberg:

We are in receipt of a referral from the FBI dated April 18, 1977, directing our attention to paragraph three of your request to the FBI dated October 27, 1975, for copies of materials which you furnished to the FBI concerning the Silver Shirts and David DuBois Mayne.

The FBI informed you by letter dated April 14, 1977, that the materials you furnished were transmitted to the Department of Justice on February 17, 1940 in the case entitled "David DuBois Mayne; Forgery in the District of Columbia". We have been unable to locate the materials. A search in the name of David DuBois Mayne reflects five Criminal Division documents pertaining to the materials. Those documents indicate that the materials were returned to the FBI on March 6 and March 7, 1940. Copies of the five documents are enclosed. We have referred your request back to the FBI for further response to you.

We are also in receipt of your letter dated April 20, 1977, suggesting that in processing your request for records about yourself we should have located records concerning you in connection with the Mayne matter, the case of U.S. v. Mary Helen, and several other matters. The Privacy Act, under which a request by a person for records about himself is processed, only requires search in the name of the requester. As we indicated in our letter dated April 15, 1977, search in your name did not reflect any records pertaining to you.

Nevertheless, in accordance with your April 20, 1977, letter and the referral from the FBI, we have now searched, pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act, in the name of David DuBois Mayne. As indicated above, we have located the five abovementioned documents pertaining to you. In addition, in accordance with your letter of April 20, 1977, we have searched under U.S. v. Mary Helen. That search did not reflect any records. The other matters which you set forth in your letter do not reasonably describe the records sought, as required by the Freedom of Information Act, since your descriptions of the records fail to provide information sufficient for search.

Regarding your reference to interviews of you and your wife by the FBI in connection with the Alger Hiss case, you are further advised that we have already reviewed all Criminal Division documents which we have been able to locate, in processing another request. We recall no reference to you or your wife in those documents. The approximately 500 pages of such documents are, however, available to you at \$.10 per page, if you wish copies.

Finally, we note your question regarding the June 10, 1966, memorandum from the Deputy Archivist to Marion M. Johnson. Our records reflect that the National Archives and Records Service consulted with the Department of Justice regarding the releasability of the document. On November 19, 1976, we advised the Office of Legal Counsel-which was coordinating the consultation for the Justice Department-that the Criminal Division had no objection to the release of the document. You should direct any further inquiry regarding the matter to the National Archives and Records Service.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. HOOVER,
DIRECTOR, FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

Reference is made to your memorandum of February 27, 1940, transmitting twelve large envelopes turned over to Special Agents by Harold Salsberg, who stated that these documents constituted the files of David G. Harbo, in which you requested to be advised what, if any, action should be taken by the Bureau in the premises.

The envelopes in question are herewith returned, together with a memorandum prepared by Mr. James E. Ruffin, Special Assistant to the Attorney General in this Division, showing the result of his examination of the documents in question. Inasmuch as Mr. Ruffin has reached the conclusion that no Federal criminal statute seems to have been violated no further action is believed warranted.

As I understand it, the United States Attorney at Washington, D. C. has some phases of this matter before him and it may be that the enclosed documents would be of some assistance to him. It is, therefore, suggested that it might be advisable to have the agents who received these documents bring the same to the attention of the United States Attorney.

DAVID D. WAYNE.

Pursuant to your request, I have read all of the contents of the twelve large envelopes pertaining to the David D. Wayne matter. You will recall that Wayne is the individual who is alleged to have recently been instrumental in causing charges against the Dies Committee to be brought by Congressman Hook on the floor of the House upon documents which seem to have been fraudulent.

The papers examined by me were delivered to the Federal Bureau of Investigation by one Harold Teisberg, who purportedly stated that the documents constituted the files of Wayne. Several days ago Congressman Hook turned over to the Department copies of the alleged forged documents, as well as other papers, which he asked the Department to study. These papers are not part of the ones under consideration here, although there are some duplicates of his papers among those here considered.

The documents here considered consist of various letters and copies of letters which purportedly passed between Wynne while he was agent in Washington for William Dudley Kelley and other persons allegedly in Kelley's employ during the years 1938 and 1939. There are also some pamphlets which were purportedly published by some of Kelley's concerns during that time. Among these is a pamphlet published during 1939, which makes certain scandalous references to the President in connection with birthday balls held for the purpose of raising funds to be used in fighting infantile paralysis. All the evidence on this point consists of the pamphlet itself, which, of course, adds nothing to what information we have already received on this phase of Kelley's activities. As this phase of the matter was investigated thoroughly last year by several attorneys in the Department, of course I am expressing no opinion on it in this memorandum.

Excepting this pamphlet referring to the President, and assuming that the mails were used in connection with the various other papers herein considered, which could easily be shown, I can find no Federal statute which seems to have been violated in the premises.

A reading of these papers does not change the conclusion reached by me in the memorandum of February 23rd above-mentioned, which was that the evidence submitted fails to show a violation of any Federal statute.
