also inoperative. Mailgrams were sent out to some houses asking how they were coping.

The two largest firms affected were Praeger Publishers and E. P. Dutton. Both have set up temporary numbers where messages can be left for the duration of the telephone emergency. Praeger can be reached daily from 9 to 5 at (212) 675-8403. Dutton has a special number at the Farrar, Straus & Giroux switchboard: (212) 741-6976. This is a direct number and a member of the Dutton staff will be taking messages from 9 to 5. Jane Pasanen told PW that many people were calling their warehouse, A-Betta (212) 357-6868-and leaving messages. Marigold Travel Agency, which arranges most of the travel for the company, provided an extra desk and telephone which Dutton used to set up two author tours.

Milton Gladstone, president of Arco Publishing, claims that it has not been difficult to do business. He anticipates saving money on future phone bills since he can determine how much money and time is invested in unneeded phone calls.

Knox Burger, literary agent, said he was operating his business out of a corner candy store. Messages can be left for him after 10:30 A.M. at CH 2-6412. Nancy Crampton, photographer, can be reached during the phone crisis at 924-5451.

"People come through in a crisis," said Ms. Pasanen. She finds this situation similar in some ways to the transit strike that affected New Yorkers several years ago. "You can still get in touch with publishers during the telephone crisis," she said. "However, a little more ingenuity is required."
