I am sending you articles that I promised during our conversation, and a copy of a letter that I also discussed with you.

I have been unable to find the card of Fitzgerald, the electrician, but I will find the card and the literature I promised and furthermore, I told you that I never heard anybody use the name "Shaw". But after viewing the pictures you showed me, I saw Shaw's picture in the bunch of pictures and on my way back, it came to me that Shaw had come into my office between June and August 1963 on a Sunday and used the name "Broussard" and stated to me that he lived in the French Quarters and his relations had a big restaurant down there. There were two men with him, who looked to be Frenchmen, but I did not see either one of their pictures in the group that you allowed me to examine.

I would be willing to swear in any Court in any land that the man who told me his name was Broussard was undoubtedly Shaw.

I am enclosing some of the material that Broussard wanted from me and will send you the balance as soon as I find it.
