

Abernathy Sees 'Fascist Domination'

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 12 (AP)—The Rev. Ralph David Abernathy told the Southern Christian Leadership Conference today it might be necessary to return the "Poor People's March" to Washington later this year.

"We may be forced to liberate and occupy the Justice Department and Congress," Mr. Abernathy declared. "This fascist domination has got to go."

Mr. Abernathy's remarks were contained in his annual report as the president of the civil rights group.

Commenting on the possibility of another march on Washington, Mr. Abernathy declared:

"I don't know what fashion or form but at least I know this: in the face of a repres-

sive, anti-black, anti-poor, anti-peace, anti-youth national government, it becomes our duty in the nonviolent movement to return to the seat of government."

He called for a "new civil disobedient patriot."

Mr. Abernathy said, "When we get to the seat of government this time, we must confront the strangling and crippling bureaucracy with militant and sustained civil disobedience."

"I doubt if anyone knows how the 1970 elections will turn out, but I do know this—black and poor people are in danger in this country. Unless we bring about representative government, then there will be no American government."

He said the Vietnam war has dragged on too long and

the nation's draft system is inequitable, advocating repeal of the Selective Service system during times of undeclared war.

He noted that certain

groups, such as the Quakers, "enjoy almost automatic exemption of active duty in the Armed Forces" and said he will seek similar exemptions for the civil rights group.
