Jackson Resigns SCLC Post

CHICAGO, Dec. 11 (UPI)— The Rev. Jesse L. Jackson today resigned from the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, in which he had been national director of Operation Breadbasket, its economic arm.

His resignation, announced here, was in the form of a telegram to Dr. Ralph Abernathy, SCLC president, and Dr. J. E. Lowery, chairman of the board. Jackson signed it "the country preacher, Jesse Lewis Jackson."

After a conference here last week, SCLC leaders relieved Jackson of duty for 60 days while they started an investigation into the incorporation of "Black Expo," an exhibit which grossed \$450,000 by its display of industrial products, business services and arts in the black community.

In suspending Jackson, Abernathy at the time emphasized that Jackson was not accused of any fiscal irresponsibility, but that SCLC objected to his incorporating Black Expo without consulting the executive committee.

In his telegram of resignation, Jackson said that he had served "with deep humility and great pride" since his appointment in 1966 by the then president, the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

It was not immediately clear what Jackson's future relationship to SCLC at large would be.
