Dear Mr. Kelley:

My apologies for the error in payment for the NAA materials. A check in the correct amount is enclosed.

Concerning the matter of my request for the identification of the spectrographic comparison samples, I seriously doubt that any "private" experts on the FOIA would know any more about those items than I do. I feel this is especially true considering that there seems to be some question regarding their status, at your end.

You may recall, that in past correspondence on this subject, you have at times stated that such information did not come within the purview of the FOIA and at other times, treated my request as though the information was subject to the FOIA. If the Federal Bureau of Investigation has not determined which is actually the case, how could a private civil attorney do so? Therefore, I would appreciate being advised as to which position the Federal Bureau of Investigation prefers to take in this matter.

In a recent letter from Dr. Guinn, he advised me that the spectrographic materials he referred to, were copies obtained from Dr. John Nichols of the University of Kansas who originally got them from the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I would like to receive a copy of that particular material furnished to Dr. Nichols.
