

Rockville Spy Case Suspect Winnes Preliminary Hearing

The Rockville case, which has been described as the most serious espionage case in the country since the trial of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, was given a preliminary hearing today before Judge John C. Adams in the District Court of the United States.

The hearing was held at the Rockville Federal Penitentiary, where the suspect, Winnes, is being held. The hearing was held in the presence of the FBI, the State Department, and the local press.

Winnes, who is a former member of the Communist Party, was charged with the theft of classified documents from the State Department. The documents were said to include information on the development of nuclear weapons.
