The Washington Post's George Lardner was here all day Tuesday. Although I had spoken to him only in terms of a book, he had to propose a story to get the time. Editor Ben Bradlee likes the idea of a story. In response to my apprehensions, including that it might suggest such a book to others, his response was that he knew of two other reporters, both of whom hate Garrison, who were working on stories. So before too long the criticisms will be getting wide attention. and they may, in fact, kindle book interest. In any event, they cannot be avoided, however the attention influences interest in a book.

We have this verbal agreement on a book, my porposal he accepts if he does a book. He takes all his expenses off the top and we split the remainder evenly.

He left with so much we had to use a grocery bag to hold it. The script is based on a real (but dead) man named Boxley was an assistant district attorney when Carrison got interested in the JFK assassination who was also CIA and he wrecked the investigation. The truth is that Carrison hired Boxley after his "probe" as it was called in New Orleans was public knoledge and Carrison paid him from private funds from some of his wealthy supporters. He gave the group the name "Turth or Consequences." Maybe "and" instead of "or." I have, among a number of revenut Carrison staff records, the truth on this. And it was I who did the work that got Boxley fired, after Carrison's staff tried and failed. I had and Lardner now has a carbon of the hasty analysis that aid the job and the documentary backstopping of it. I'd annotated a copy of Garrison's book for a history professor friend and he got it to me in time for Pardner to take it with him.

So, he has much to read to begin with. We left it that after he reads he'll prepare questions and we'll tape my responses when he returns. We did tape more than two hours but that perforce rambled much.

Garrison was his own kind of Inspector Clousseau (?). He went big for a fake book by French intelligence supposedly on the JFK assassination and I have the res proof from his staff records. Lardner was amused and has that.

The more I think about it the more convinced I am that this book has enormous potential and I'm sure that when he is informed enough to question me I'll think of more.

Meanwhile, by now there should be some commotion In dallas over the filming, which was to have started the 15th and for which "ealey Plaza was to have been closed to all traffic for two weeks. Perhaps the "imes will have some stories you may see. I'd appreciate copies, as of anything else also.
