

Oliver Stone- phone call from a Ms. Rosconi who works for him, from Dallas, 3/13/91

A little before 6 p.m. a woman whose voice was difficult for me to understand phoned to say they had just gotten the letter I'd written him about a month ago, that he was reading and was interested in my books (first three, she said, but said he especially liked Oswald in New Orleans, which she said is also her favorite), and she'd like to call me back tomorrow, maybe the next day.

I told her that when she is in touch with Andrea Jaffe, to please tell her that the delay in the books she ordered through the Vroman book store was not on this end, and I explained about their delay and that the order went out in the next mail after I got it.

I also told her that the order of these two books only might be a bit unusual and might indicate a special interest because they are the only books in which I published the transcripts of Warren Commission executive sessions.

If that is their interest, they are welcome to xeroxes of the others that I got by FOIA if they'll pay the cost, including the time it takes Helen to retrieve, copy and refile them.

The woman's name is Rosconi.

It seems to me to be a little odd that they was so pleasant and still had that letter.

Oswald in New Orleans has long been out of print, but Garrison as well as critics has a copy of copies. He got several cartons of them when it appeared.

I am not aware of any orders for books that could have been for Stone.
