On those men, when the pictures were clearly misused in the King case and I called that to the FBI's attention, they identified and interviewed the two policemen and one deputy and Stone, meaning Garrison, is full of what he is usually full of. There is an error in the FBI report, rather in the recollections. They all said it was about a mile away, not three plus blocks.
