Oliver Stone On 'Nightline'

Oliver Stone, the director-writer whose film "JFK" has gotten enough advance publicity to make a press agent's year, will be the sole guest on ABC's "Nightline" (tonight at 11:30, Channel 7), a spokeswoman said.

Stone will be interviewed in Dallas by "Nightline" anchor Ted Koppel in Washington, ABC said yesterday.

Stone's movie dramatizes conspiracy theories on the assassination of President Kennedy.

There's no doubt in my mind that that was a military-style ambush."

ON THE AUCTION BLOCK: Sotheby's New York auction house will put Jimi Hendrix memorabilia on the block. Heavy bidding is expected in Tuesday's auction of handwritten lyrics for 13 songs that were never released, a 38-page treatment for a movie that was never made and a travel bag the musician was carrying the night he died.
