GOOD MORNING: A firsthand report on how the dissolution of the Soviet Union is affecting Cuba comes to us from director Randa Haines, just back from the Havana Film Fest with "The Doctor." "I'm still in cultural shock," she reported. "There are long lines for gas—since they aren't getting it from Russia. Food is in short supply. At an ice cream place that normally served 28 flavors, now three. Everyone is very worried." She met Fidel Castro, "who is incredibly charismatic. He apologized for the lack of the usual (festival) celebrations. But," Haines noted, "everyone was very generous." She said Disney made a print of "The Doctor" with Spanish subtitles for her to take to the fest—she flew out of Mexico City via Cubana Airlines. They gave her a standing ovation for "Doctor," also when she was announced for "Children of a Lesser God." She didn't know how they were able to see "God"—but they did. Raines is admittedly an aficionado of Latin music and said she danced until 5 ayem and is prepping her next film, "Salsa—A Love Story," about a North American woman and a Latin man. "And it involves dance," she smiled. Haines is encouraged for Oscar chances on "The Doctor" by crix remembrance of "Silence of the Lambs," released in February—her movie was a summer release ... She was so impressed by young Cuban filmmakers and fans, she returns in March to teach at a Havana film school ... Talking Oscar: Chuck Workman is again assigned by producer Gil Cates to produce a seg—this one a six-minute tribute to comedy—200 pix clix ... Leonard Engelman, chairman of the Makeup Artists Committee for the Acad, now has his own cosmetics line—Taut.

John Connally is skedded to give his opinion Monday on "CBS This Morning" after paying to see the movie at a local theater near his ranch this weekend ... The second "opening night" party for Joan Collins and the "Private Lives" cast was hosted by Allan Carr, at Chasen's. Collins remains remarkable—she bounced into the party after the wordy Noel Coward legiter, which includes considerable Collins calisthenics. Collins is as exuberant as the (very) young actress we first met on the set of "The Girl in the Red Velvet Swing" back in 1955 at 20th-Fox. "But I nearly had cardiac arrest, darling," she said about the workout on the boards. Would she return to a series after the planned short run on B'way? "I never say 'never' about anything any more," she laughed. Sister Jackie was not present at the party—she was at husband Oscar Lerman's bedside at Century City Hospital where he's being treated for back problems. Gavin MacLeod wings in to see "Dennis" as well. Chambers will also exec produce "Dennis the Menace" at WB with John Hughes as producer of the movie based on Hank Ketcham's comic strip. The busy Chambers is also readying "Freeing the Whales" with Martin Bregman ... The Armed Services YMCA of Oceanside brings 15 Marines to cheer residents of the MPTV Country House today—after they salute Ronnie Reagan at his office ...
