

Cochran gets a boost from Bailey

LOS ANGELES — Back in La-La land. . . F. Lee Bailey says there is "no doubt" in his mind that his client O.J. Simpson is innocent. He believes the true story will come out and that the murderer or murderers will be apprehended. The defense team has its own detectives working on the case.

Other interesting Bailey quotes: "Johnnie Cochran is probably the best trial lawyer now working in this country. . .
