Silver, who plays him in the movie, then gave producers documentation of factual errors. Kissinger said his contributions were ignored. The producers, unwilling to let evidence interfere with ratings, proceeded with essentially the original script," he said. The script rewrote history by suggesting that Nixon and Kissinger double-crossed South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thleu and by altering the president's conditions for/ peace, Kissinger said. He also complained that he is portrayed as a "reptilian Kissinger" who cons "a booking, anti-Semitic Richard Nixon into peace talks with Hanoi." Lionel Chetwynd, the movie's

writer and executive producer, defended his interpretation of events. "We went to all the supporting source material. I stand by the scholarship of the film," Chetwynd told the magazine. "I don't think the factual events could be in dispute, though Henry Kissinger may interpret them somewhat differently from the historians we consulted." Kissinger and Nixon's differences over policy were public record, he said. "This was not intended to besmirch [Kissinger], but to inquire into the events that surrounded this moment in history," Chetwynd said.

STATING THE FACTS: Former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger has given a thumbs down to an upcoming television docudrama based on his relationship with the late President Richard Nixon Juring the Vietnam War era. "The film brazenly reverses history," Kissinger wrote in the
