

A 'Revolutionary Union' Is Killing Top U.S. Figures, Agent Finds

Three political assassinations and one attempt during the past decade are all part of the same conspiracy, experts from two national organizations believe.

The assassins were all tools of a "Revolutionary Union," similar to the ones causing a current wave of terrorism, including the kidnapping of Patricia Hearst, the experts told TATTLER.

Tim Heinnan, one of the undercover agents who worked the case involving the attempted assassination of Alabama Gov. George Wallace, told a TATTLER reporter that Arthur Bremer, who was convicted in the case, was not working alone nor, as authorities have claimed, was he "a lone psychotic gun nut."

He said Bremer was part of the same organization responsible for the assassinations of President John F. Kennedy, Sen. Robert Kennedy and civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King.

Heinnan said he hopes to bring knowledge about the conspiracy to the public and to open the case to public congressional hearings.

Also seeking a congressional investigation are Donald Freed and Mark Lane, authors of the "non-fiction" novel "Executive Action" and heads of the Kennedy Assassination Continuing Investigation Committee.

Freed, of Beverly Hills, Calif., told TATTLER the organization is distributing petitions to urge Congress to reopen the Kennedy assassination probe.

Freed's organization is seeking two million signers. He said his group has set next fall as a target for making a full-scale push for the congressional investigation.

TO BACK UP his startling conspiracy theory, Heinnan made these comparisons:

- Sirhan Sirhan, Robert Kennedy's convicted assassin; Lee Harvey Oswald, accused murderer of John Kennedy and James Earl Ray, convicted of Dr. King's murder, were all

acquainted with the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) and all had dealings with groups intent on the need for violent action in America.

- "All of these men maintained diaries ... I find it unusual for men to maintain diaries ... and in their memoirs it is carefully spelled out that they were working alone."

- "When Arthur Bremer was arrested, the FBI received a call ... which left Bremer's apartment unguarded and allowed important documents to disappear."

- "E. Howard Hunt (convicted Watergate conspirator) has testified during Watergate investigations that he was told by Charles Colson to proceed to Bremer's apartment in Milwaukee and remove evidence before the FBI could get there."

(TATTLER last week reported for the first time anywhere that E. Howard Hunt may have been in Dealey Plaza in Dallas at the time Kennedy was shot. TATTLER printed the never-before-published blow-ups of photographs of a man at the assassination site that closely resembled Hunt.)

- "When Hunt told Colson he couldn't get there, he (Colson) called then FBI Director Patrick Gray and Gray gave the order to leave the apartment unattended."

- "I have received some of the documents ransacked from Bremer's apartment, and his tax records indicate he was being financed by someone."

- "While I was working for the Milwaukee police, I learned that Bremer had met with Michael Cullen, who has since been deported for un-American activities, and discussed the need to assassinate Gov. Wallace."

Heinnan, sponsored by the American Opinion Speakers Bureau, is seeking open hearings before the House Committee on Internal Security.

Ray, seeking a new trial on the charge he murdered Dr. King, is now claiming the murder was the outcome of a conspiracy. He earlier maintained he was acting alone in the assassination.

Freed said his organization believes the three assassinations and the attempt on Wallace's life are related, "but we don't have any concrete evidence."

Freed is calling for Congress to set up a national committee of inquiry to probe the assassinations, especially the death of President Kennedy.

"IT SHOULD NOT be headed by Leon Jaworski (the current Watergate prosecutor)," said Freed. "It should be headed with somebody like John Dohr, Archibald Cox or Wayne Morris."

Freed said information presented in the Nov. 25 edition of TATTLER will be part of his organization's presentation to Congress in an

attempt to reopen the investigation. On the 10th anniversary of President Kennedy's assassination, TATTLER devoted an entire edition to stories about the assassination, including new evidence never before published.

"The conclusions of the Warren Commission (which investigated the assassination and reported Oswald acted alone) leave grave doubt," Freed said.

"How many times, under the guise of national security, has the CIA suppressed vital information?"
