Two Louisiana men have told TATTLER they were offered a large sum of money to fly two mysterious passengers from Dallas to a Latin American country on the day John F. cennedy was assassinated.

in Dealey Plaza on Nov. 22, 1963. Both men, who insist they turned down the offer, are convinced the proposed flight would have been for the escape of Kennedy's assassins after the President was shot to death

They said the flight proposal was made to them by a Garland, Tex., man while all three were employed at Ling Temco-Vought, a sprawling Dallas defense plant.
