On November 22, 1963, JOSEPH SCHECHTER, 603 Brittmore Road, Houston, Texas (telephone HO 8-1172), telephonically advised Special Agent CLARENCE E.WRIGHT that in his opinion, a CLIFF TAYLOR might be a suspect in the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY. He stated TAYLOR has expressed a very radical attitude toward President KENNEDY in the past and is believed to have led some of the demonstrations against President KENNEDY the last time he was in Houston. Mr. SCHECHTER stated he believes TAYLOR would be capable of this kind of act adding TAYLOR lost his job as a result of his radical views.

Mr. SCHECHTER stated that CLIFF TAYLOR resides some place in the Spring Branch area of Houston and that he was last employed by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in the Machine Accounting Department, Houston, Texas.

He stated that TAYLOR matches the general description of the assassin as given over the radio and described him as follows:

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent FRANK M. IVEY on November 22, 1963 at Houston, Texas:

Examination of the telephone directory for the City of Greater Houston for 1963, reflected that one CLIFTON H. TAYLOR resided at 3922 Willow Springs.

Attempts to locate for interview, CLIFTON H. TAYLOR at 3922 Willow Springs, determined that Mr. TAYLOR was employed as a clerk at the U-TOTE store, 10407 Shadow Oaks Drive.

CLIFTON H. TAYLOR, clerk at U-TOTE M Store, 10407 Shadow Oaks Drive and resident of 3922 Willow Springs, advised that he formerly worked in the Bookkeeping Department of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and was discharged from this employment because of his voiced dislike for President JOHN F. KENNEDY. Mr. TAYLOR said he could establish an alibit throughout the day of November 22, 1963 and in addition stated he has been at his present place of employment since 6:00 P.M. He said it would have been foolish for him to have pulled such a stunt as the assassination of KENNEDY in Dallas, however, stated his only regret in the matter was the fact that the assassin did not complete the job with LYNDON JOHNSON.

Mr. TAYLOR stated he could provide no suspects in instant case. He further declined to be additionally interviewed.
