Visitors Center Expansion Ushers in New Level of Service

Wisitors who come to The Sixth Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza for the first time this summer may not realize it, but they are the beneficiaries of a recently completed major expansion and renovation project designed to make their visit to the Museum a more pleasant and rewarding experience.

What these visitors have found thanks to the million-dollar expansion and renovation project which increased the Visitors Center from 4,000 to 6,500 square feet—is a more spacious and visitor-friendly environment than previously existed at the Museum. Construction was completed in early June, and visitors have been enjoying the benefits ever since.

"The expanded Visitors Center is a direct result of our growing audience," said Jeff West, Executive Director. "We look forward to being able to better serve our visitors and assure that they have the best experience possible."

For summertime visitors, when Museum visitation is at its annual peak, a major benefit of the expansion program is the Museum's larger lobby area. In the past, visitors often had to queue up in a line stretching outside the building and down the sidewalk. Now visitors can wait in airconditioned comfort.

There are numerous other benefits for visitors as well—including a greatly enlarged Museum Store. Not only does the store now carry a greater variety of educational and commemorative items to offer visitors as a remembrance of their visit, but it promises to deliver more revenue to support the Museum, its expanded programs and ongoing operations.

A new entrance and exit on the north side of the Visitors Center welcomes visitors coming from the nearby West End Historic District, and addresses problems of traffic flow and congestion that have grown with Museum visitation over the years. Some 432,000 visitors toured the Museum last year —more than double the amount during the Museum's first year of operation in 1989. (Visitation is expected to increase to some 600,000 visitors annually by the year 2000.) Is it possible to undergo a major expansion project while continuing to serve the public at a national historic site? Amazingly, yes. This expansion project took place while the Museum continued to be open for business. Credit both the Museum's staff and our visitors for making the best of uncomfortable times during the disruptive influences of the construction period.

The project also set the standard for future expansion of Museum activities to the seventh floor and in a Public Research Center to be located elsewhere in the building,

We invite you to visit us this summer, and see these results for yourself. The Sixth Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza is open seven days a week from 9:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. During July and August the Museum will be open for extended summer hours on Thursdays. Fridays and Saturdays, from 9:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m.

his summer The Sixth Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza is benefiting from four interns working with our historic collections. For the third year in a row, the Museum has received generous support from the Exxon Community Summer Jobs Program for a collections internship. Through the Community Summer Jobs Program, Exxon provided grants for seventy-five Dallas area nonprofit organizations to hire college undergraduate students for an eight-week period. This year the Museum matched Exxon's 1997 support to bring in three **EXON** additional interns for the summer.

As the Museum's Exxon CSJP Intern, Heather Russell, a senior majoring in History at the University of Texas at Arlington, is reviewing, processing, and cataloguing the Museum's largest individual collection—the Julia Knecht Collection. Chad Wolf, a junior majoring in History at Southern Methodist University, and Geoffrey Schmalz, a junior majoring in History at Macalester College in St. Paul, Minnesota, are working on verifying and cataloguing collections acquired by the Museum prior to 1994.


The Museum's fourth intern, Kim McCoig, a junior at Austin College with a double major in History and English, is assisting with a complete, item-by-item inventory of the Museum's collections. McCoig interned with the Museum last summer also.

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Minute-by-Minute on the Dow-Jones News Wire

hen major news stories break. their impact can hit Wall Street hard-and that's what happened when gunfire ended the life of President John F. Kennedy. Now, thanks to a donation from a New York securities analyst, the Museum can document the information received by financial institutions around the world.

William H. David, then a securities analyst, recently donated his personal copy of the Dow-Jones news wire from November 22, 1963. The paper teletype, printed by a typewriter-like machine connected to a telephone line, measures about six inches wide and twenty feet long. It covers the time from 12:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. CST.

The Dow-Jones News Service, a subscription service for those in the financial industry, offered shortened news stories from two of the largest news sources, the Associated Press and United Press International, and added stories from its own reporters. The selections were chosen to represent events that might influence business decision-making.

Within minutes of the shooting, investors sold off stock to avoid losses from plummeting prices, and the Dow ticker was soon eight minutes late trying to keep up with transactions. Just before 1:00 p.m. CST, this announcement appeared:

"As instructed by the SEC (Securities and Exchange Commission), the Board of Governors of the New York Security Dealers Association has requested its members to cease trading until further notice."

Stock exchanges around the world closed down shortly afterwards.

David, who lives in Brooklyn, New York, retrieved the teletype from his office the night of the assassination. The cleaning

crew had not yet gotten to his wastebasket. Although David told us he generally doesn't save things, he carried this ticker tape with him through several moves.

Last fall, David learned that Sotheby's had auctioned a similar copy of the Dow-Jones wire covering the entire day from the opening of the stock market through closing. He called Sotheby's and learned The Sixth Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza was also interested in such items. His next call came to our Director of Interpretation, Marian Ann J. Montgomery.

"At first, I was afraid he wanted to sell his copy to the Museum," said Dr. Montgomery, "Since we couldn't afford the complete wire at the Sotheby's auction, I felt sure we didn't have enough in our budget for his version. We are thrilled Mr. David chose to donate this important artifact."
