## Athens: Plot Aimed at JFK's Son

ATHENS, July 15 (AP)—The Greek government announced today that security forces had arrested eight Greeks who it said planned to kidnap John F. Kennedy Jr., son of the late President Kennedy.

The government also announced that police had arrested four West Germans, including a young woman, on charges of planning bombings, kidnapings and assassinations in Greece.

The government announcement said that the eight Greeks also sought to overthrow Greece's military-backed regime.

The announcement described the eight as being members of a guerrilla organization called "New Left."

The government said the arrested Greeks had planned to kidnap ambassadors, bankers, and such prominent people as young Kennedy, II, who often spends vacations in Greece. Details of the alleged plan to kidnap him were not disclosed.

The announcement said the information was divulged by the group's leader, Christos Ramadanis, 31, during interrogation by military police.

The announcement said security police arrested the Germans, all described as students, a week ago. It added that they allegedly planned the escape of a fugitive Greek opposition figure.

The announcement said the four arrived here under orders from an anachist organization with headquarters in Stuttgart, West Germany, just a day before their arrest.

The Stuttgart organization gave orders to the four to aid in the escape of Edith Economou, wanted by the authorities for anarchist acts, the government said.
