Exile Regime Opposed by Senate Unit

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, (D-Mass.)-urged yesterday that consideration be given to the establishment of a permanent inter-American institute to stimulate democratic-oriented political development in the Western Hemisphere.

He did so as part of a report in which the Senate Judiciary subcommittee on escapees and refugees, of which he is chairman, reaffirmed its conclusion that establishment and recognition of a Cuban government-in-exile is inadvisable.

It said an inter-American institute of political and social science under the Organization of American States could be established in cooperation with the Alliance for Progress.

"The institute would bring together hemisphere leaders in the academic, labor, business, and political communities," Kennedy wrote, "in order to achieve ag reater articulation in the problems and direction of democratic institutions and practice in the Americas."

In "view of continuing activities in some quarters," it said, neither the precedents in recent history "nor the hard political facts in the Cuban situation" justify the recognition of Cuban government-in-exile, the subcommittee delcared.
