

## Bundy Links Johnson,

### Kennedy Viet Policies

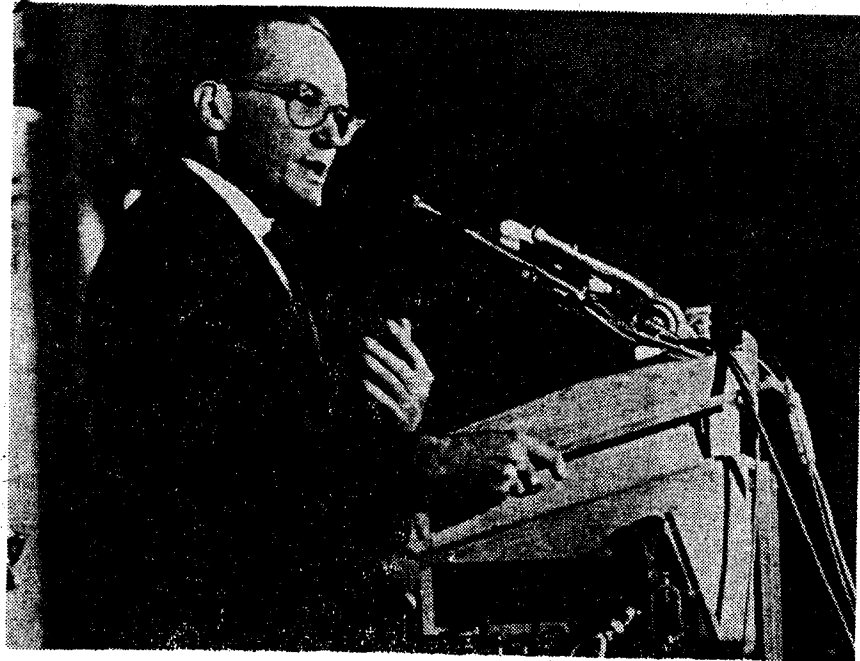

McGeorge Bundy, special assistant to the President on national security affairs, declared yesterday that he believed that there was a "single thread" connecting the Vietnam policies of President Johnson and the late President Kennedy.

Bundy was addressing a National Press Club luncheon prior to his scheduled departure from the White House to join the Ford Foundation in New York.

"It is right and important to see that policy as having developed through three Administrations (including Eisenhower's)," Bundy said. Commenting on a recent statement by Secretary of State Dean Rusk that it is inconceivable that the South Vietnamese people would elect a Communist government, Bundy said that he agreed.

"Our conviction is," he continued, "that the real and strong preference of the South Vietnamese is to avoid coming under Communist control . . . the difficulty which the Communists have in obtaining genuine, popular support is that their methods have been in view for a very long time."
