

## Cuba Officials Are Reshuffled

MIAMI (UPI) — The Fidel Castro regime Wednesday announced a reshuffling of second-string government officials and said Raul Roa Kouri, son of Cuba's foreign minister, has been relieved as ambassador.

News of changes and new appointments in three ministries and the National Bank, reported in a Havana radio broadcast monitored here came as Cuban exiles launched a boycott of Mexican films and called for a "continental campaign" against tourism to Mexico.

Angered by Mexico's reluctance to back hemispheric sanctions against Castro, exile organizations mapped plans for an anti-Mexico boycott similar to that instituted against Britain last February.

### Stickers Plan

Thousands of signs and stickers reading, "Don't Vis-

it Mexico, An Enemy Territory" will be printed, Cuban exile spokesman say Cardenas Marx Leyte Vidal have been "assigned to other duties in the revolutionary government."

### Roa Relieved

Roa, son of foreign minister Raul Roa, was ambassador to Brazil until the Joao Goulart government was overthrown last April. He departed for Havana abruptly as soon as Goulart's ouster was confirmed. Before going to Brazil he was envoy in Communist Czechoslovakia.

Leyte Vidal's last assignment was not announced by the broadcast.

Other changes announced in the radio report included:

German Blanco Fernandez, National Bank vice president, named deputy minister of foreign commerce succeeding Carlos Verdecia Hernandez, who "resigned."

Arthur Guzman, deputy of minister of industries, named "first deputy minister" of the same department and succeeded in his former post by Andrews Yerba Garcia.

Jose Morales Hernandez named Deputy transport minister.
