

Reports Say Indonesia Jailed 5000

DJAKARTA, Nov. 14 (UPI)

The official news agency Antara reported today that more than 5000 persons implicated in the Oct. 1 Communist coup have been arrested in West and Central Java.

Radio Djakarta quoted Information Minister Maj. Gen. Achmadi as saying that approximately 7000 rebels were still holding out in Java, main island of this troubled nation.

He said many had surrendered and that reports of recent violence in East Java were exaggerated. But he added that some Chinese shops had been burned by angry anti-Communists.

The Antara dispatch said 2100 Pemuda Rakjat (Peoples Youth) were captured near Klaten in Central Java during the month of October alone. Antara said die-hard conspirators had plotted to seize the town of Klaten Oct. 22, but were foiled by the army.

President Sukarno, meantime, called for top-level cabinet sessions Monday to discuss economic rehabilitation of the country. Suggested pay raises for the military and civil servants were among the topics to be discussed.

Radio Djakarta also reported that economic reforms were discussed in place sessions Saturday between Sukarno and his three deputy premiers, Dr. Subandrio, Johannes Leimena and Chai-rul Saleh.

In other developments reported today:

—Documents captured in Central Java were said to reveal Communist plans to take over major industries.

—Troops and government officials searched the office of Indonesia's third-ranked Communist Party leader, M. H. Lukman, and seized a jungle-green rebel uniform, a yellow ribbon believed to be a rebel identification sign, and books and documents. Lukman was last seen a week after the attempted coup.

—A Communist female assassin with a secret identifying insignia stamped on her thigh, was seized in Northern Sumatra. She confessed she

had been assigned to kill a Moslem leader.

Sukarno Hails JFK In Autobiography

Indonesian President Sukarno says his country and the United States "might not have drifted so far apart" if the late John F. Kennedy had not been assassinated.

Sukarno, in an autobiography to be published Monday, says Kennedy "was a man with a progressive mind. When I discussed my aid problems with him, he understood."

"Sukarno: An Autobiography, as Told to Cindy Adams" (Bobbs-Merrill, \$6) is an extremely frank version of the controversial Asian leader's life.

Sukarno is critical of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, who he claimed twice "publicly humiliated me." According to Sukarno, the insults came when Sukarno paid a visit to the United States in 1956. Eisenhower not only failed to meet him at the door of the White House but kept him cooling his heels in an anteroom for an hour, he said.

The second incident occurred, Sukarno said, when Eisenhower was in Manila in

1960. "Practically on my doorstep, he refused to visit Indonesia . . . not once has any American Chief of State set foot on our soil though I have repeatedly extended the invitation."

Sukarno says that his relations with the United States are at "an all-time low" and he must bear some of the blame because he "began the name calling."
