

## Pravda Prints Castro Pledge on Emigration

MOSCOW, Oct. 8—Pravda, the Communist Party newspaper, today printed the kind of news rarely seen in the Soviet press.

It published Premier Castro's promises to allow free emigration from Cuba and the Danish Prime Minister's defense of American policy in Vietnam, of West Germany and of NATO.

Soviet citizens could read Castro's Oct. 3 pledge "not to force anyone to live in this society against his will." Emigration here is extremely limited, even for members of families separated by the Soviet border. The government has seemed to consider emigration not as the right of an individual, but as a reflection on the nation.

However, recently the government has let a number of the so-called American Armenians leave. Emigration from among this small disillusioned group of former American citizens, who returned

voluntarily to Soviet Armenia after the war, was not possible in Khrushchev's last years.

Pravda also published the responses of the visiting Danish leader, Jens Otto Krag, to familiar charges made yesterday by Soviet Premier Kossygin. It was a rare instance of a Western viewpoint given without rebuttal and in the Westerner's own words.

On NATO Krag said that "until the United Nations provides an international security system, it is necessary to have a regional security system." He also said that "being personally acquainted with the West German leaders, I do not believe them to be revenge seekers" and that "I would like to recall some proposals (in Vietnam) by the United States President to start unconditional negotiations. I believe that if the sides take the road of negotiations it will be possible to ensure peace in that area."
