

Phaseout

Washington Post Staff Writer President Johnson's proposal to phase out the popular program of direct Federal loans to college students was unanimously rejected yesterday by a House Education subcommittee.

The Administration's proposal was "eliminated com-pletely," Chairman E d i t h Green (D-Ore.) said after her subcommittee on higher education met in closed session. Five Democrats and four Republicans urged that the Federal loan program be funded at its full authorization of \$190 million.

The President had urged the substitution of the new \$700 million for the second system of Federally insured year, \$900 million for the private loans for the direct third and \$270 million for Federal loans now made to students under the National graduate school facilities.
