"I believe that we can nego tlate with Hanol and with the National Liberation Front," he said in his statement, "confident that a free, neutral and independent Vietnam can be established, with guarantees of stability from an international body."

"That would be the best thing that could happen to us." Gavin answered when Gore asked if a neutral Vietnam might emerge. He said that 20 years ago the United States considered a neutral nation to be an enemy, but that things had changed since then.

He also called for a halt in the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam without "any stipulaion" of what the Communists might do in return. But while he urged an early settlement of the Vietnamese war, he said that situation was not comparable with the one in Thailand.
