

## Plan to Use A-Weapons Cooled Peking, Ike Says

NEW YORK, Sept. 18 (AP) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower said tonight he was prepared to use nuclear weapons against Communist China during the Korean war and that the Communists' knowledge of this "had a great effect" in ending the conflict.

He said, in an interview on National Educational Televi-

sion, "I let it be known that if there were not going to be an armistice that I would no longer regard this war as being limited to deny ourselves the right to attack wherever we saw enemy coming at us—meaning that we were not going to be bound by the kind of weapons that we would use.

He continued: "I don't

mean to say that we'd have used those great big things and destroyed cities, but we would use them enough to win and we, of course, would have tried to keep them on military targets, not civil targets."

Asked about use of nuclear weapons today, Gen. Eisenhower said no one would say in a sane moment that the

United States should ever make a massive nuclear attack on the Soviet Union—unless the Russians make such an attack on the U.S.

But he said, "This does not mean that in sticky situations that you couldn't use a proper kind of nuclear weapon sometime. I just don't see any difference between gas warfare and this kind of warfare . . ."
