Soviets Call U.S. Policy Intervention

The Soviet press yesterday described U.S. foreign policy as intervention everywhere.

Commenting on President Johnson's speech at the University of Denver, the Tass news agency said Mr. Johnson's principles "envisage interference with the affairs of other countries on all continents and ideological subversion against Socialist (Communist) countries."

Tass said the President conceded that the United States has no mandate for interfering in the affairs of other countries but nevertheless takes sides with certain groups in Latin America, Africa, Vietnam and Communist countries.

In other developments:

- Russian Adm. Andrei Chabanenko, warning of the danger of American nuclear-armed submarines, said that not every American President can be trusted with the fate of the world. Writing in the newspaper *Sovetskaya Rossiya*, he said that even the ordinary peacetime movements of American atom submarines posed a serious threat of accidentally touching off a war.

- A three-minute film showing downed American pilot Maj. James H. Kasler being treated in a North Vietnamese hospital was released in Tokyo. The film showed doctors applying a cast from Kasler's hip to his chest. His right leg was already in a cast.
