Three Red Nations Spur Nuclear Curb

VIENNA—A proposal by three Communist countries may be of major importance in controlling the spread of nuclear weapons, according to observers at the International Atomic Energy Agency conference which ended here yesterday.

Poland, Czechoslovakia and East Germany said they would submit their atomic installations to the agency's inspection, if West Germany would do the same.

West Germany replied that its facilities were already under the control of Euratom, the West European Atomic Community.

A total of 56 reactors in 25 countries are under agency control to prevent the military use of nuclear materials. Many delegates to the IAEA, including the American, called the agency a principal instrument against nuclear proliferation. Ninety-six nations belong to the IAEA.
