Panamanians Stone Base of Castro Foes

PANAMA, Feb. 10 (AP).-Demonstrators stoned a Cuban exile headquarters building in Panama last night after speak-ers denounced the exiles as "worms supporting North American imperialism." Most of the windows in the building were broken. National guardsmen then moved in and broke up the demonstration. From 2,000 to 3,000 demonstrators first assembled at Santa Ana Plaza and later a splinter group of about 200 was intercepted by Panamanian guardsmen as it moved on an intersection leading into the United States controlled Canal Zone. The crowd dispersed without incident.

Assail Castro Foes Speakers assailed the anti-Castro Cuban exiles for spreading reports that Castroites and Communists organized and led the January 9-10 Canal Zone disorders in which 27 persons were killed, four of them United States soldiers.

The crowd was about to storm the darkened Cuban exile twostory building in downtown Panama City when the guardsmen arrived and talked them out of it.

The demonstrators had marched downtown from the presidential palace, first stop after leaving the square.

President Robert Chiari was out of town, but his ranking cabinet minister, Max Arosemena, told the crowd Panama would take its charge of aggression against the United States to the United Nations if the Organization of American States did not act on the charge.

Leftist Speaks The principal speaker at the plaza rally organized by the Panamanian Students Federation was the federation's leftwing president, Victor Avila. He urged Panama to press its aggression charge in the United Nations, declaring "Panamanians have no faith in the United States controlled OAS."

Mr. Avila called for the expulsion from Panama of Cuban exiles and "Yankee newspapermen."
