Cuba Policy Is Reviewed By Mexico

MEXICO CITY, July 27 (UPI) — President Adolfo Lopez Manteos and his top aides began yesterday a series of meetings to decide whether Mexico will abide by a hemispheric call for sanctions against Cuba.

Foreign Minister Jose Gorostiza, who did not attend the Organization of American States meeting in Washington at which Cuba was condemned for aggression, said an official statement might be issued Wednesday.

The OAS resolution, which among other sanctions urged that hemispheric nations "not maintain" diplomatic relations, was passed by a 15-4 vote. Those nations still maintaining diplomatic relations—Mexico, Chile, Bolivia and Uruguay—were opposed.

(In Montevideo, government sources said Uruguay will break diplomatic relations with Cuba.)

Mexico's stand on the resolution is of key importance because it has been the leader of those nations favoring a hands-off policy toward the Communist government of Premier Fidel Castro.
